**REFLECTION**

There were two plants named in today’s gospel, which drew my mind back to two past events. Firstly, the mustard seed, as we all know, the mustard seed is one of the smallest of all seeds and grows into one of the biggest of all shrubs. But whenever I hear the word mustard my mind is drawn back to the first time I first tasted Colman’s mustard. For years as a child I had seen my father have mustard with everything and whenever I asked to try some I always got the same answer. “It’ll be too strong for you, you wouldn’t like it.” I of course thought that he was just scared in case I liked it and then ate it all up. I was sure that as I liked marmite which had a sharp taste then I would be bound to like mustard. So one afternoon I got the jar of mustard and spread a big dollop all over some bread and ate the whole lot in one go. When my voice eventually returned the next day and the redness had left my face I came to the conclusion that mustard was not like marmite.

Despite its nice yellow colour and many peoples fondness for it, it has a very sharp and powerful taste.

In many ways Faith can be similar, the outside appearance of the Christian religion can seem a bit wishy washy, yet if one actually receives the gift of Faith from God then it can be very powerful and sometimes a tough thing to accept and the easy option would be to deny it and pretend that one hadn’t received it.

Faith can enhance our lives; it can add more flavour and sustain us through tough times. We must always remember that when we pass on the Faith, we must not smother others with it, we should try to gently introduce people to our Church and help them to learn about our Faith gradually.

Faith is a gift, it is a seed that is in many people and it is up to us to help the seed grow. Rather like mustard, when we hand on the faith a gentle approach can help some ones Faith to grow a like.

The mustard seed a small seed can turn from something small to something all encompassing. The Faith we have can help us through tough times as well as good.
