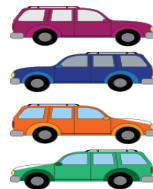

**REFLECTION** – In the Gospel today we hear that the people are confused by Jesus. They hear him speak in the Synagogue and have problems with Jesus taking up his mission. They say that surely this is Joseph's son, the son of a carpenter. Yet here he is in the Synagogue spelling out the mission he is to undertake. He goes on to tell them that a prophet is never accepted in his own country. Jesus then recounts some of the incidents which the prophets had when they cured those from outside Israel. Even at this early stage we see that Jesus has come for everyone, not just Israel. At this point those in the Synagogue want to kill him and throw him off the top of the hill. But Jesus knows that he has to perform his mission and he gives them the slip. Jesus knew from the outset that to perform his ministry, he was going to have to move to other towns.

In the letter of St. Paul we are told that we all grow up and don't stay like children for ever and that there are three things that stay with us the whole time and that is Faith, Hope and Love. We also never lose the talents that we have been given by God. We simply mature in our faith and hopefully get better at the talents we have.

I can always remember being taught how to play rugby at school and realising pretty fast that it wasn't going to be my best sport. Indeed, all I ever did was stand on the wing and waited for the ball to be passed to me and then running as fast as I could to the try line and hoping that I didn't get tackled. It can be a tough realisation for some, that one cannot be good at everything. One thing we learn when we grow up is discovering what we are good at and what we are not so good at. We can waste so much time trying to be someone we are not. Our Choir leader at college always told us that everyone could sing but it was a gift to be able to sing in tune. It was maturity to realise that if one couldn't hit the right note, then sing a bit quieter. Jesus knew that his mission was to preach to everyone and to accomplish this, he had to move outside his own people. May we always use our gifts for the good of others.
